SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - YEAR B

Lv 13:1-2. 44-46: Ps 32: 1 Cor 10:31-11:1: Mk 1:40-45

A friend of mine in Vietnam was diagnosed that he had tuberculosis. The doctor advised him not to share the dishes, the cups, and many other things in his home with the family. He was not even allowed to have his meals at the same table with his wife and children; he always ate his meals alone – totally isolated. Tears rolled down quietly on his cheeks each time he had his meals. People in the neighborhood, and even in the family, began to avoid him. He himself had to keep distance from his wife and children for their safety.

To be shunned by someone you love is one of life's greatest hurts. It may happen between friends, between lovers, between husbands and wives because of sickness or because of disagreement. People avoid each other's company, or refuse to speak to each other. We know how much it hurts to be shunned.

In the ancient world, leprosy was a terrible disease – something like AIDS today. Leprosy eats away the flesh until the leper is left with a stump of a hand or a leg. The sufferer might be considered a living death. We can feel the pain, both physically and emotionally, of the leper in the gospel story today. Lepers are isolated, banished from the community, exiled from home, as we hear from the first reading, too.

The leper who comes to Jesus in today's gospel is shunned by everyone. His situation is hopeless. But in despair this man kneels down at Jesus' feet and begs for healing: "If you wish, you can make me clean." The leper cries, prays, and implores Jesus with an absolute trust in healing power of the Son of God.

Notice how Jesus reacts. Jesus is "moved with pity." Though everyone else shuns the man, Jesus does not. Though everyone else flees from the man in horror, Jesus does not. Instead, Jesus does the unthinkable. He reaches out to touch the man. He touches the leper's wounds without hesitation. He is not afraid that he might be infected. And at Jesus' command the leper is cured. In a single moment his life is changed. He is restored to his friends and to society. He can lead a normal life again.

Jesus touches the untouchable. This is good news for the leper and also for us today. Jesus is the friend

of the outcast. He rejects no one who comes to him. His hand went out to the man from whom everyone else would have shrunk away. Jesus' touch gives hope to the hopeless. He restores people to fellowship with one another, and with God.

St. Paul urges his people in the second reading: "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ." Being followers of Jesus Christ, shall we touch the untouchable? Love the unlovable? Forgive the unforgivable? Jesus did all these, and so must we. In Christian love, we are not afraid to stretch out our hands to help the helpless and to uplift the hopeless.

Sometimes, people worry about being unclean. Clean or unclean is only from the mentality of our society. Jesus said: "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." Touching the sick, or eating our daily food, does not make us unclean, but what can make us unclean are our evil thoughts, words, and deeds.

The message of today's gospel is this: Jesus Christ changes lives. He gives hope to the hopeless. He welcomes outcasts and restores them to fellowship with God, and with God's holy people. Therefore, brothers and sisters, let us be imitators of Christ to learn and bring into practice Jesus' teaching through St. Paul's words for us today: "whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God."

Jesus Christ can change our lives. Like the leper, you and I have only to admit our needs, and come to Jesus with humility and trust, and then we will receive the gift of healing and forgiveness. And in turn, let us learn from Jesus to reach out to help those in need: to give hope to the hopeless, to touch and heal the wound of the untouchable, to forgive the unforgivable, to welcome and the outcast and to love the unlovable as Jesus has loved us.
