People sometimes do things without knowing why they're doing what they're doing. A young lady is cooking a Thanksgiving meal. As always, she cuts off an ending piece of the ham before putting it into the cooking pan to bake. Her husband curiously asks her why she has to throw away a piece of the ham, she says: "I don't really know why, but I have learned this from my mother since I was a kid. Anyway, let me call and ask my mother."

The mother answers the phone with all laughing: "Don't be silly, my dear. I cut off the end of the ham just because the butcher's ham was always two-inches longer than my cooking pan. Now you have a bigger cooking pan, you don't have to cut off a piece of the ham and throw it away." Be sure you know what you are doing.

The young lady cuts the end of the ham and throws it away; but she doesn't really know why she does that. There are questions regarding what a priest does during the Mass, such as: why does the priest put a few drops of water into the wine? Why does he need to wash the hands? Why does he break a tiny piece of the consecrated host and drop into the chalice? Why do we exchange the sign of peace before receiving the Communion? When entering the church, why some people bow, but some others genuflect? What does that mean to make the triple sign of the cross: on the forehead, on the mouth, and on the chest, before the gospel reading? And many more questions.

Every act or ritual we do at Mass must have its reason. Be sure we know its meaning. We cannot answer all these questions in this limited time, but maybe only one question at a time, or you can ask me later if you want.

Regarding the triple sign of the cross before the gospel reading, I remember when I was a kid, I saw people do this and I just imitated what they did... With my observation, I thought people did something like roughing on their forehead, their mouth, and their chest. So, I just did the same like that without questioning... However, here is the meaning: when we sign the triple sign of the cross, we pray

asking the Lord to open our minds to understand God's word, open our mouths to proclaim the word, open our hearts to love God and his word... So, be sure we know why we do what we do.

From today's gospel, Jesus knows very well the thoughts of the Pharisees and the scribes when they ask him: "why do your disciples not follow the tradition of [washing hands and vessels], but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?" So, Jesus challenges them to see deeper meanings of human tradition, and of religious rituals they perform every day. God wants our humble spirit than our thoughtless ritual; God loves our sincere heart than the burning offerings on the altar.

"Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come from within are what defile." Food doesn't make people bad, but what makes us bad comes from our evil thought, hatred, envy, malice, arrogance, greed, lust, adultery...

From all the readings today, we are challenged to "hear and understand" the words. That means using more than our ears. It means filtering the information through our minds and hearts so that our actions reflect the meaning of Jesus' commands.

In Deuteronomy, God tells the people to "hear the law of God and to observe the law." St. James tells us the same, to be "doers of the word," not hearers only. For a person of faith, hearing the word of God must lead to obeying its commands and putting the word into action.

When Jesus quotes from Isaiah saying: "This people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me," he wants to remind us to understand the true meaning of our love and relationship with God and neighbor through our good deeds rather than merely the ritual in our worship, or attending Mass, or wordy prayers.

My brothers and sisters, let the word of God take root in our hearts and lead us into actions. Being "doers of the word, not hearers only" means to observe the rituals we perform at the Mass, and practice and live accordingly to what we learn from the Mass. We may spend more time in daily prayer. We may volunteer to visit and bring Communion to the sick and the homebound. We may generously offer our time, gifts, and talents to help our parish in different ministries. Love is our response, to be doers of the word, not hearers of the word only.
