SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

Dn 7:13-14; Ps 93; Rv 1:5-8; Jn 18:33-37

Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. This celebration marks the conclusion of the Liturgical Year B, and we will begin a new Liturgical Year C with the first Sunday of Advent next week. But what does it mean to us with this celebration: **Christ the King**?

Just as the Jews were waiting for a messianic king from the line of King David to come and deliver them from oppressors, when we say *Christ the King*, we probably think about the rule, the power, or the authorities which all the kings of this world have.

But as mentioned in the gospel, when Pontius Pilate asked Jesus: "are you a king?" Jesus clearly declared: "you say I am a king. For this I was born and for this I came into the world... But my kingdom does not belong to this world" (*In 18:36*).

So, when we say Christ the King, we probably wonder: what kind of king is this who only receives mockery and humiliation? Jesus is the Son of the almighty God, the creator of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. Therefore, obviously, Jesus is the king of the universe. But his kingdom does not belong to this world. Jesus is the king who does not have a golden throne as other kings of this world have; instead, his throne is the cross.

Kings and queens of this world exert power over their subjects. Down through history, thousands and millions of subjects have died for their kings, but Jesus is the king who "comes to serve, not to be served" (*Mt* 20:28). Jesus is the king who gives us the example of a servant leader: to be a leader is to be a servant of all (*Mt* 20:26). Jesus is the king who dies for us. No other king has ever died for his subjects.

Today, if we look up to the cross, we may ask: where is that power? Jesus is the king who shows us another kind of power from the cross: the power of love. He accepted crucifixion as the perfect obedience to God the Father. Jesus, though he was in the form of God, emptied himself and took the form of a slave, being born in the human likeness; he humbled himself, obediently accepting even death, death

on a cross. Jesus is offering himself to God the Father for our sake because he loves us: "there is no greater love than laying down one's life for one's friends" (*Jn 15:13*).

While other earthly rulers, and even some religious authorities, use their power to achieve their own purposes, Jesus' power is shown in his service to us, and his willingness to lay down his life for us. While we are tempted to choose the rule of other powers and principalities, such as greed, violence, indifference, cruelty, aggression, the celebration of today invites us to fix our gaze on Christ, the King of the Universe, and follow his model, as he said: "if you want to follow me, deny yourself, take up your daily cross and go with me" (*Mt* 16:24).

Jesus' kingdom does not belong to this world; but his kingdom is "an eternal and universal kingdom, a kingdom of truth and life, a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love and peace" (see from the Preface). His kingdom requires us of our love, our closeness, and our tenderness to our brothers and sisters. When accepting Jesus to be our King, we are required to follow his example: to reign is to lay down one's life for one's friends; to rule is to serve, not to be served.
