SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME – YEAR C

People have different views about the concepts of rich and poor. There is a very rich businessman, but money doesn't make him happy. Being so busy with works day after day makes him feel tired and more depressed.

One day, he decides to take some time off, trying to find quiet time with nature. He wanders through a poor fishing village. Walking from afar, he hears somebody whistling joyfully. He comes closer and sees a poor fisherman mending nets in his boat. The fisherman keeps whistling, and then singing joyfully by himself.

The stranger curiously asks him: "My friend, what makes you so happy? How can you keep singing while living in such a poor condition?" The fisherman first feels upset by this impolite question. He then answers with a smile: "How do you know that I am poor? I am not poor. Look! God gives me everything: ocean, boat, nets, and even a tent to live in. Daily I go fishing. I have enough food to eat. I have good sleep at night time, nothing to worry. Nobody bothers me. What more should I expect? I am happy with what I have. Who can take away that happiness from me?"

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us an understanding of "rich and poor" concept, totally different from our general viewpoint. It is hard to accept what Jesus said: "Blessed are the poor. Woe to you who are rich." Nobody wants to be poor, but according to Jesus: "Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours." The poor need God like young children rely on their parents. The poor are closer to God, for they need God; and the Lord hears the cry of the poor. The poor are comforted. The poor are loved.

This seems offensive and unfair to those among us who are financially rich. What does Jesus mean by saying: "Woe to you who are rich"? Does he mean that God does not love the rich at all?

We should understand that God loves us all, rich and poor alike. Prosperity is a sign of God's blessing for us. God promises blessings to our ancestors, to Abraham, and his children forever. Jesus

probably wants to remind us that: materially poor but rich in God's eye is more important than materially rich but poor in God's eye. Normally, when people grow rich, they may easily gain power and arrogance. They may think that money can do everything. Money becomes more important than God.

Materially rich does not promise us the life everlasting. Only those who are rich in God's eye, who do not trust in human beings but only put their trust in the Lord, can achieve the eternal happiness. The poor fisherman has a true happiness since he is content with what he has in life, and he really appreciates whatever the gift from God.

If we are blessed to be rich materially, and if we want to enjoy our true happiness, Jesus reminds us not to rely on the material richness, but use our wealth properly, so we can build our richness in God – a treasure in heaven. Money is the means for us to live, not our ends. Our ultimate goal is to build our richness in God, by loving God and by sharing our blessings with those in need.

In conclusion, let us take the message from Prophet Jeremiah for our reflection: "Cursed is the one who trusts in human beings; blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord." Let us be rich in the eye of God, put our trust in the Lord, and do good for one another.
